Dear Parents/Carers,

April 2023 Newsletter

We have only been in school for 2 weeks of April and so this Newsletter will not be as 'full' as others often are.

April has brought us **Easter** and **Eid** and I know that a large number of our families have been really busy in their celebrations of late. Our thanks go to many members of our school Muslim community who very kindly provided Eid Gift bags to all of the children in school this week; we are grateful for their generosity and for the time it must have taken them!

It is hard to believe that we are now into the last term of the academic year. As I have said many times before, it is a really busy term and there are a lot of events scheduled and many deadlines to be met, some of which you will see at the end of this Newsletter in the **Diary Dates** section.

The KS2 SATs have been pushed back a day due to the **additional Bank Holiday on Monday 8th May** in celebration of the **King' Coronation** on Saturday 6th May. In school we will be recognising this national event on Friday 5th May.

There will be a bit of an in-school competition for EYFS-Y5 (not Y6 - it is their last school day before their SATs begin!) AND we are asking the children (Y6 can do this) - and staff - to add a little 'red' into their school uniform - as we already have the blue and some have the white. It is **NOT** a non-uniform day, it is an **'enhance your uniform day'** - replace the blue t-shirt with a white or red one, replace the blue sweatshirt/cardigan with a red or white one, wear red or blue socks, add a red/blue/white ribbon in your hair...as said it is NOT a non-uniform day it is a red/white/blue uniform enhancement day - less is more!! As a national event, and a moment in British History, we feel it should be acknowledged/marked in some way. This does mean of course that **on the next 2 Mondays the school will be closed** (Monday 1st May being May Day Bank Holiday).

I know I have said what I am about to say many times before(!!) but as we head into the Summer Term and the weather - hopefully - gets warmer and sunnier, please could I once again ask that all items of school clothing are named, most especially sweatshirts and cardigans that, when the sun comes out and the air heats up, are the first things that the children remove and often abandon. It is then nigh-on impossible returning these to the individuals if the items are unnamed and unidentifiable. In addition, should the weather improve and sun hats/caps become the 'order of the

day', could these please be named too – one blue baseball cap looks like any other!













Thinking of the sun and heat...

Our school's Sun Safety slogan continues to be:

'WRAP, SPLAT, HAT!'

WRAP up in a long-sleeved top/wear clothing that protects rather than exposes the skin.

SPLAT on some sun-cream – Factor 15+ (preferably much higher!)

Put a *HAT* on that protects your face, ears and neck.

Our full school 'Sun Protection and Awareness Policy' can be found on our school website:

Essentially, it states the following:

- * Children are encouraged to **spend time in the shaded areas** in the playground/field during lunchtime play during the summer months.
- * Wherever possible **school events are scheduled** to take place outside the hours when the sun's rays are most harmful
- * Outdoor events are postponed or cancelled if the weather is exceptionally hot e.g. Sports Day
- * Children may be kept inside during playtimes and lunchtimes if the weather is exceptionally hot and shade cannot be found ('exceptionally hot' is to be deemed by the HT/DHT and is a 'local decision' based upon 'current' weather conditions)
- * Children in the Foundation Stage are discouraged from spending long periods of time in the Foundation Stage Outside Area and whenever possible are encouraged to stay in the shade
- * When **planning outdoor visits** during the summer months attention will be paid to adequate control measures to reduce the risk of damage from the sun, and specific Risk Assessments may be drawn up to reduce potential damage by the sun.
- * The wearing of sun hats is encouraged. All children are encouraged to wear a sun hat during playtimes when the weather is hot.
- * Children are allowed to apply **sun cream** at lunchtime during the summer months (*if parents wish them to do so*) especially those children with sensitive skin and those who are at high risk of sunburn. Any sun cream bottles brought into school must be labelled and will be kept in a safe place in the classroom.











- * Staff will not assist pupils with the application of sun cream; parents should apply an application of the product before school and pupils should be taught, <u>at home</u>, how to apply a 'top up', <u>should it be required</u>, at school. We find that for the vast majority of our pupils, a 'good' application of suncream BEFORE coming into school will suffice for the day, as along as the other precautions above are followed. This avoids the unnecessary demand of pupils applying their own suncream in school!
- * As children's **sunglasses** have little protective factors in terms of sun protection they **are not encouraged in school**; they also have limited protection as a pollen filter/pollen block. Pupil's choosing to bring sunglasses into school do so at their own risk loss, damage, personal injury. We do not ban sunglasses, nor do we advocate them as being 'of need' for the vast majority of pupils; there will, however, always be the 'exception' and we are happy to deal with each on a case-by-case basis.
- * Water bottles should, as always, be brought into school on a daily basis and the children will be actively encouraged to drink water at regular intervals during hot weather to prevent dehydration. These bottles will need to be taken home each evening in readiness for the next day's use (washed out and refilled).

All of this said, last Friday it was a matter of warm waterproof coats, umbrellas and wellies, the morning started so cold and wet, but we have to hope for a summery change!

And finally, a further reminder about **PE Kits** please...as reported in previous Newsletters, we have an agreed expectation for our PE Dress Code and therefore class teachers and those leading PE sessions, will be sending 'reminder slips' home with pupils <u>if</u> their PE Kit is noticeably 'away from' these expectations. The vast majority *are* 'on point' but some are still inappropriate for school and need to be 'revised'. Thank you.

Please do now read on to find out more about life in our school .
