I am saddened to say that there are more **teacher strikes on the horizon**; saddened that <u>they still need to happen</u>. The original; reason for the strikes was to do with 'centrally-funded pay increases', and this is the reason <u>staff in our school</u> have chosen to strike at times this year and this is what they have felt so passionate about. A centrally-funded pay rise means more money for education and for the pupils of the school and that is what my staff believe in.

The national strikes days are Wednesday 5th July and Friday 7th July.

Our Transition Day was scheduled for Friday 7th July, in line with the majority of the secondary schools in our local area, but we have had to change this day/date as they have had to change theirs. This means that our new Transition Day will be Thursday 6th July. But please note, we are NOT changing the date for our new EYFS intake pupils, that is remaining as Friday 7th July as this was too much of a logistical and organisational nightmare to alter! If this does lead to any inconvenience we apologise, but to use one my well-used sayings, 'it is what it is!'

If there are further closures still to come these will be communicated to you at the earliest opportunity.

North Charnwood Cross Country Shield Winners!

49 KS2 children were due to contest the third and final Cross Country League race at Charnwood College last Tuesday. All had been attending recent training sessions in preparation for this event as we were leading ahead of 19 other schools going into this final race.

Unfortunately, due to the torrential rain we had on the morning of the race, the organisers had to cancel the event. With no plan to reschedule the event this late in the term, it was decided that the final result would be based on results from the two previous League races. Fantastic news for us - we have been crowned the League winners with 660 points, ahead of Sacred Heart (617 points) and St. Pauls (477 points)!

A huge well done to all the children who have participated in this event this year. Every single child contributed to our final score as points were rewarded for finishing, as well as bonus points for positions. Thank you to all our parents and carers who have helped with transporting children to these races – one was even on a parents evening! We couldn't do this without your support.

Quad Kids Athletics

Our athletes have had a busy time recently, firstly competing in a Quad Kids Competition against 11 other schools at the end of May at Charnwood College. Quad Kids consists of 4 girls and 4 boys all competing in 4 athletic disciplines – the howler throw, a standing long jump, a 50m or 75m sprint and a 400m or 600m (depending on the age group,) with all their results contributing to the overall team score.

It was the turn of our Year 3 and 4 athletes first who all gave 100% effort in all their events, scoring consistently well over the 4 disciplines. The team were absolutely delighted with their 2nd place overall and silver medals, narrowly beaten by Sacred Heart Primary School.
